From the President's Desk

As you read in our last issue, our new board of directors has completed its reorganization and has begun a review of our Five Year Plan. The reorganization and the membership of every village on the board is itself a result of our Five Year Plan Objective VIII.B. which reads, "Promote greater village corporation participation in BSNC through consolidation, reorganization and merger to ensure corporation survival of both by 1985."

To carry the objective to the next logical step, consolidation and merger, requires that our villages be willing either to come under BSNC's wing or to take over BSNC. Our new organization does in fact give the villages control of the board. This fact is reflected in the board decision that we continue to provide services to the village corporations in accounting, land management and stock registry. The board also took a pragmatic approach and directed that we work out a fee schedule to charge the village corporations for the work that we do for them.

With the board size increasing from 15 to 24 members, there was a

With the board size increasing from 15 to 24 members, there was a real potential for having an unwieldy working body. However, with the committee system that is now in place our board is actually more involved than it was before. The standing committees are: Resources, Land and Village, Personnel, Finance, Audit, Planning, Bylaws and Scholarship. With all action items being dealt with by the respective committee before going to the full board, the board action is speeded up without cutting down on pertinent discussion.

Your new board of directors is off to a good start. Every member is now responsible to a constituency and is more responsive to your needs.

Help for elders

Senior Citizen Toll Free Number Now In Service

Seniors in nearly every community in Alaska can now dial a new toll free number, Zenith 1059 for information on Longevity Bonus, housing, health care, employment, Social Security, Supplemental Security Income, senior services, Medicare and a wide variety of other senior citizen concerns.

The line will connect callers with information and Referral workers at Older Persons Action Group, a statewide non-profit organization concerned with senior issues and affairs.

"There are many agencies in Alaska to help the senior citizen, but finding the right agency to meet your needs can sometimes be frustrating and complicated," explained Nona McVickar, Information and Referral Coordinator for Older Persons Action Group.

The Zenith number will be especially helpful for those seniors

who live in communities where no senior programs or services are now offered.

If Older Persons Action Group workers cannot solve a problem for a caller by providing simple information, they will direct the senior to the appropriate local or state agency, or contact the agency on the senior's behalf.

McVickar stressed that the new service is not intended to draw seniors away from local projects but to supplement the efforts of local programs.

"OPAG's Information and Referral program offers a one-stop information service to seniors and senior service providers, and to family members on the senior's behalf," she said.

The toll free information service is available weekdays 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

NWCC Council Representative Blanche Walters welcomed the crowd of the graduates' families and friends to 'this celebration of these people and their achievements." After an invocation by Reverand John Pitney, greetings were given by Adele Locke, Public Information Officer for the University of Alaska and NWCC President Robert Jackman.

sley in his address to the graduates stressed that "You stand at the crossroads in your career. You have a contribution to make to the people of Alaska. There is a critical need for leadership in several areas including commerce and academics."

Hensely further stated that those graduates "from the villages have a special role. You understand our people, land and environment. You are people who love

the land and can best serve the community. The only thing that stands in your way (of success) is your own perception of your potential."

Student speaker Bruce Tungwenuk originally from Wales, spoke of the importance of an education. "Skills and education are needed to cope with society in Nome as well as in the outside world."

After the diplomas were conferred Nancy Mendenhall, NWCC Director of Educational Services presented Recognition Awards. Willis Walunga was cited for his Outstanding Service to the Community College Council. He is retiring after serving for nine years.

Three faculty members also received Recognition Awards. Ethel Payton, who is in charge of Office Occupations was selected as the Outstanding Full-Time Faculty member. Almost 200 students per year utilize Payton's program. Maynard Perkins was selected as Outstanding Part-Time Faculty. With NWCC since 1977, Perkins has most recently taught Agronomy, Math, College Study Skills, Photography and Aviation Science. He is also on staff of the Adult Education Program at Kawerak.

The Outstanding Program Award went to Gambell's Susie Silook who is director of the Distance Delivery Program. This program enables students to take college courses while living in the village via audio conferences and videntages.

Dollars & Fense

This column will be published every month in AGLUKTUK. It is intended to provide information, give advice and answer questions on accounting matters for the village corporations. Your questions are welcomed. Write BSNC Village Accountant, Box 1008, Nome, Alaska 99762 or phone 443-5252.

Since many of the village corporations in the Bering Straits Region have a fiscal year ending June 30, 1984, it is time for them to prepare for their annual financial audit. With this in mind, this month's column will concentrate on audit preparation. Here are some helpful suggestions:

1. With each deposit you make, you should list each check including the name of the payer, the amount, and what the check was in payment of. This should be attached to a copy of the deposit slip and kept on your files. This will assist the auditors in identifying the receipts.

2. All checks should be used in numerical order. All checks should be recorded in the check register before they are distributed: Be sure to record checks that are voided!

3. At the end of the fiscal year, whether it is 6-30-84, 12-31-84, etc., the following lists should be put together:

(a) A list of all accounts receivable (bills owed to you) as of the year end. List as collectible and uncollectible amounts.

(b) A list of all accounts payable (bills that you owe) as of year end.

(c) Gather all minutes of the Board of Directors meetings for the entire year.

(d) List all inventory giving the quantity description, and landed cost per unit (including freight). Also the original invoices are needed to verify the ending inventory.

(e) Notes receivable with a copy of the written agreement.(f) List all prepaid expenses

(such as insurance, rent, etc.)
(g) List all additions or disposals of property and equip-

posals of property and equipment.

(h) List all notes payable and include a copy of the written agreement.

There are two seminars which are in the planning stages. These both could be covered in the same workshop. The first is a tax planning seminar conducted by personnel from Stock, Inc., the CPA's in Fairbanks. This would be beneficial to many corporations as they become unable to offset income with previous losses on their corporate tax return (also known as "exhausting loss carry forwards).

The other seminar is a 3 hour session conducted by IRS personnel from Fairbanks which would cover payroll tax reporting (Form 941) This would be beneficial for all corporation bookkeepers and managers and requires a minimum of 15 participants.

to be held this summer in Nome.

At the Bering Straits Native Corporation Board of Director's meeting held on May 18, 1984, the Board approved the reallocation of the first 193,280 acres of 12(b) lands to the village corporations. This leaves approximately 100,000 acres remaining to be reallocated at some future date.

Section 12(b) of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act states that the difference between 22 million acres and the total acres selected by the village corporations would be allocated to the regional corporations who would in turn be solely responsible for distributing or reallocating that land to the village corporations. For the Bering Straits region, that allocation was 293,760 acres.

Various reallocation methods were considered and the one adopted consists of dividing the first 100,000 acres to give each village corporation a minimum of 5,760 acres. The second 100,000 acres was allocated based on the 1971 enrollment of the village corporations. These numbers were then rounded off to 640 acres sections.

The nearly 100,000 acres remaining will be reallocated at a future date based on resource requirements.
