The Billiken

For generations, artists from the Bering Strait region have been recognized for their skill in carving ivory, bone, antler, and other natural materials. Among the many forms associated with Alaska Native carving traditions, the ivory Billiken—a small figure believed to bring good luck—holds a unique place as both a collectible charm and a familiar example of artwork created for trade and sale.

Around 1910, Inupiaq master carver “Happy Jack” Angokwazhuk is often connected to the early adaptation of the Billiken into ivory, possibly after seeing one at the 1909 Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition in Seattle. By the 1940s, many Alaska Native carvers were creating Billikens from ivory, stone, and sperm whale tooth, selling them to soldiers, tourists, and other visitors as good luck charms. These carvings were often accompanied by cards that read, “Rub his tummy or tickle his toes, you’ll have good luck so the story goes.”

Although the Billiken did not originate in Alaska, Bering Strait artists transformed it through local materials, craftsmanship, and style. Each carving reflects the artist’s hand, with details such as facial expression, shape, polish, and engraving giving every piece its own character. Today, ivory Billikens remain collectible pieces and reminders of the creativity, resourcefulness, and adaptability of Bering Strait carvers.

Congress Passes ARTIST Act

The U.S. House of Representatives has passed the Alaska's Right to Ivory Sales and Tradition (ARTIST) Act, legislation that protects the rights of Alaska Native artists who use legally harvested walrus ivory in traditional handicrafts, artwork, ceremonial regalia, and clothing. The bill previously was passed by the Senate and was signed into law in June 2026.

The ARTIST Act was introduced in response to concerns that state laws intended to stop the illegal trade of African elephant ivory could unintentionally restrict the sale and display of Alaska Native artwork made from legally sourced walrus ivory. The legislation clarifies

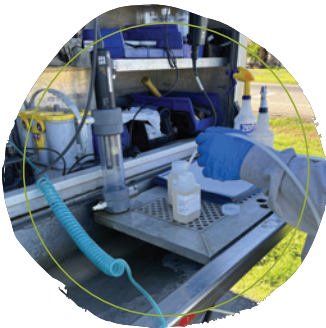
protections for Alaska Native artists and helps ensure traditional cultural practices can continue.

The ARTIST Act protects the right of Alaska Native people to continue these centuries-old traditional practices, a critically important economic driver for Alaska's rural communities.

Senator Lisa Murkowski also emphasized the cultural importance of the legislation. "Ensuring Alaska Native artists' ability to create and sell their traditional handicrafts is about more than income," Murkowski said. "It's about supporting families who have used their work to preserve heritage and culture through generations."

Beale AFB Team Earns Prestigious Air Force Award

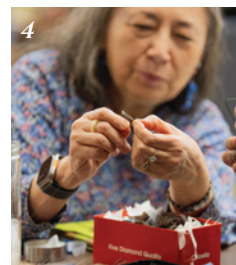
Paragon Professional Services' Folsom office proudly supported the Beale Air Force Base (AFB) Installation Restoration Team, which earned the 2024-2025 General Thomas D. White Award in the Environmental Restoration Installation category. This prestigious Air Force award recognizes excellence in environmental restoration, pollution prevention, conservation, and environmental quality programs.

Named after General Thomas Dresser White, the fourth Chief of Staff of the Air Force, the award

has been presented annually since 1962 to honor individuals and organizations that make significant contributions to environmental stewardship and national security.

Beale AFB was recognized in part for its leadership in addressing contamination from per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), commonly known as "forever chemicals." Paragon played a key role in this work through its support of the Air Force Civil Engineer Center and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Sacramento District under a six-year contract for PFAS remedial investigations. The team conducted investigations at seven sites across Beale AFB affected by the historical use of aqueous film-forming foam, a firefighting product used throughout the military for decades.

The Bird Blind by Shareholder Kira Eckenweiler

The Bird Blind is an unflinching and compassionate story set in an Inupiaq village on Alaska's Norton Sound. As generations clash, addictions simmer, and the tundra bears silent witness, a young boy and a troubled hunter expand the meaning of kinship in a makeshift bird blind. With razor-sharp dialogue and cultural truth, Eckenweiler weaves a play that is both a gut punch and a prayer revealing how even burdened people can find their way home.

New Native Theater is known for discovering and developing Native writers; following in

that tradition, this new play was directed by Artistic Director Rhiana Yazzie.

Eckenweiler was raised in Unalakleet, Alaska. She is the daughter of Gary and Willa Eckenweiler. Her maternal grandparents are the late Clarence Sr. and Guerie Towarak of Unalakleet, and her paternal grandparents are the late John and Neta Eckenweiler of Montana.

Eckenweiler graduated from Unalakleet Schools before earning a Bachelor of Music from the University of Alaska Anchorage and a Master of Fine Arts in Musical Theater from the Boston Conservatory at Berklee in 2020. She is a performer, playwright, and storyteller who enjoys both opera and musical theater. When she is home in Alaska, Eckenweiler enjoys hunting, fishing, gathering, and spending time on the land. Through her playwriting, she seeks to reflect the beauty, resilience, and rich traditions of life in rural Alaska.

BSNC congratulates Kastyn on her many accomplishments and wishes her continued success as she advances her education, research, and service to the people of the Bering Strait region.

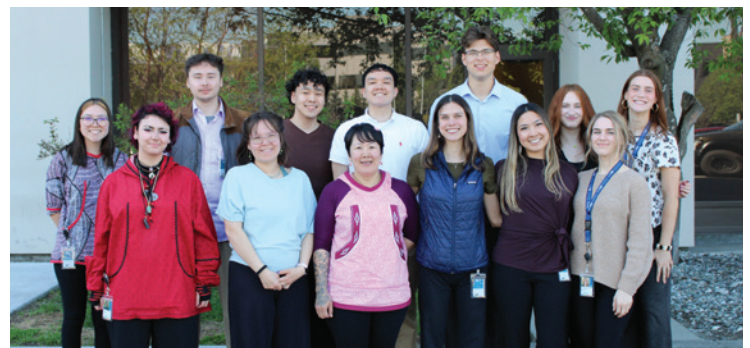

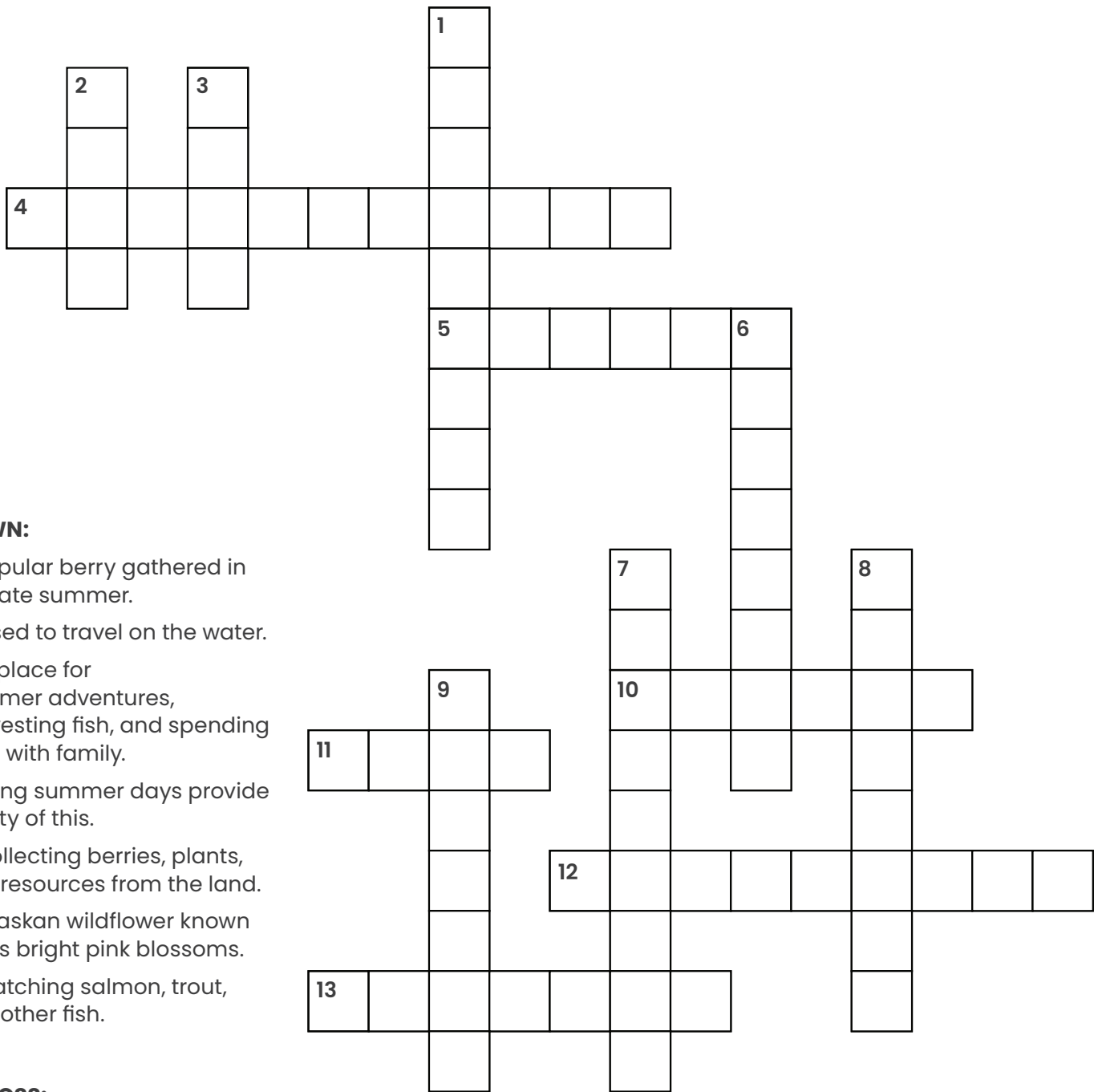
